
Marsh Summer Packed Full of Fun

It was a busy summer for Marsh Foundation youth. Aside from summer school, regular counseling sessions and community service, activity after activity kept them busy and no one had the chance to be bored.

One activity which students were able to participate in this summer was the Marsh's 4-H group, named the Phoenix Foundation. A total of six students participated in this group, completing a variety of projects.

Three students participated in a project called 'beginning fishing.' For this project students learned about the basics of fish and how to be a responsible fisherman. In addition, students had the opportunity to gain additional information from guest speakers, and they also had the opportunity to plan and participate in their own fishing trip.

Two of our students participated in a project called 'all about dogs.' This project was designed to give students information about dogs and how to care for them. To help the students learn more about dogs, the Phoenix Foundation partnered with the Van Wert County Humane Society. Group leaders would bring dogs from the Humane Society back to Campus, and students would work with these dogs. This gave students a chance to learn valu-

able skills, such as how to train dogs and how to care for them.

One student also did a self-determined project about saxophones. Having played saxophones since he was young, this student decided to take this passion and turn it into a 4-H project. For this project he used local libraries to research saxophones, communicated with a music professor from Ohio Northern University to learn more about saxophones, and visited a music store in Fort Wayne to see the different kinds of saxophones.

One of the most exciting things that happened with the Phoenix Foundation this year is that four of our students qualified for judging at the Ohio State Fair in Columbus. To qualify for this honor, students had to participate in county judging in which they created a poster about their project, presented it to a judge, and answered questions about their project.

Students were scored based on their performance, and the top scorer in the county for each project qualified to move on to State Fair judging. The Phoenix Foundation is very proud of all of the hard work our students put in this year, and the many accomplishments

we have had a very successful start to the school year. On the first day of school we had a total of 34 students. We have 23 students from the group homes, seven day students from the community, one student receiving home instruction and four students in from our foster care division.

The beginning of the school year brings many unique challenges. One of our biggest challenges comes from starting the school with a new group of students, in which most are attending our school for the first time. Our school family teachers do a great job over the summer in prepping students for school. Behind the scenes, secretary Holly Myers works tirelessly retrieving student records and updating their information in our school records systems. Our teachers create lessons that accommodate grades 2-12, yet cover the standards that each student should be receiving within that complex curriculum.

Most impressive to me, is our student's ability to adapt to our unique school environment. We have a strong group of students to start the year and we are looking forward to a

Credit Recovery

Our credit recovery program continues to be a major focus in the school. We continue to get new students that have fallen behind in their previous schools or placements. Over the summer, we had 12 students participate in our credit recovery program. These students had a combined 22 credits that we set out to recover. Of those 22 credits, our students successfully recovered 17. Mrs. Val Dunn oversees our summer credit recovery program and all teachers are involved during the regular school year. This is an accomplishment that we are extremely proud of and will continue the program into the school year.

The talent showcase will include our students and/or staff singing, playing instruments or doing skits that have a winter theme. Following the graduation ceremony and talent show, there will be a Christmas and Graduation celebration meal in the cafeteria.

Spring Program and Graduation: May 29

The program will consist of a piano recital followed by The Wizard of Oz. After the program, we will hold a graduation ceremony for our seniors.

Description of business:

The Marsh Foundation's mission is to inspire hope, to teach and to care for children and families. The agency is supported by a foundation established by a Van Wert family and has a long successful history reaching back to 1922.

The Marsh Foundation is a not-for-profit children's services agency that provides services in a variety of settings. Services include group homes, family foster care (ages 0-17), an intensive treatment program, adoption and independent living. Located in Van Wert, Ohio, the organization's group homes are licensed for up to 30 children ages 7 – 17, offers an on-campus school for grades

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they have made.

Youth were also busy this summer with the Marsh Grown Garden Program. As part of the Marsh Foundation's Independent Living Program, the Activities department again ran their Garden Program.

This program is designed to give students a chance to obtain a job on campus, as well as teach them about obtaining employment and give them experience they can take with them into the workforce.

This program helps students by requiring them to participate in an interview prior to beginning the program.

Once they are hired for the job, the students then work in the garden on campus. This garden produces a variety of different fruits and vegetables, and the students are involved in almost every step of the growing process. Students plant different plants, pull weeds in

the garden, trim plants, water the garden, and eventually pick the produce once it has grown.

After this produce is picked, the students are then involved in taking it to a local farmer's market and selling it. Throughout this process students learn many important job and life skills, such as gardening skills, landscaping, running a business, and how to handle money.

This summer's garden crew has been one of the best in recent memory. All of them have very professional attitudes, and have shown a very impressive willingness to work. The Activity Department really wants to say how proud of them we are for their work this summer, and to thank them for all of their help.


Dozens of spectators came out to support youth participating in the annual horse show in August. They were able to showcase some of the skills they have learned this summer and compete for ribbons.

The comprehensive program gives students resume and interview experience. Then, once they are hired as a part of the crew they spend a lot of time working in the garden on campus. This oftentimes means getting up early before summer school sessions.

The students are involved in almost every step of the growing process. After the produce is picked, the students take and sell it at the farmer's market. The entire process is extremely beneficial and teaches a lot of important job and life skills that the youth can take with them.

Foster Care Division Continues to Recruit, Grow

The Marsh Foundation continues to invest in the growth of their foster care division. Since the opening of their downtown office, efforts have continued to recruit much needed foster families.

Recently, Nicholas and Jenna Bishop received their foster care license. This brings the total number of Marsh foster families to 20, with another 7 currently in training.

The Marsh Foundation's Foster Care Program provides services to children from birth to age 18 throughout Ohio. Our trained foster parents provide care for youth of all ages who are in need of a safe placement.

The foster care division also offers adoption services. This simplifies the process if foster parents decide they are interested in adopting children. This year, The Marsh has facilitated three adoptions. Currently, there are 28 foster children in Marsh care.

Unfortunately, the need in Ohio is great and more foster families are needed. Parents can be married couples or single individuals. They receive 40+ hours of intensive training before having youth placed in their home. Substantial reimbursement is also available to those who qualify. 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Did You Know? We offer adoption services!

The Marsh Foundation has the ability to license homes with a dual foster care and adoption license. This means that families that may be interested



adopting their foster children in the future can simplify the process with The Marsh Foundation.

This allows The Marsh to provide additional support to families. Families that think they may be interested in adoption can complete the necessary steps up front, with very little additional work. Many families that are interested in becoming foster families are interested in accepting young children that may be available for adoption in the future.
