Loss of Dedicated and Loved Foster Mother Takes Toll on Marsh Family

In January, The Marsh Foundation family suffered the loss of a near and dear friend. Faye Lepper was fatally injured in a car accident on 224 in Hancock County.

Faye had been part of The Marsh family since 2002 when she came to work as a family teacher at Marsh Hall.

She had previously been a foster parent with SAFY and soon after coming to The Marsh, took over the Independent Living foster home on campus.

During her time with the program, she served over 60 foster kids in her care, not to mention the dozens she'd already served through SAFY and at Marsh Hall. She meant so much to so many.

Faye lived on The Marsh campus and was very much a part of our everyday lives. She will be greatly missed not only by the staff and other foster parents, but most of all by the youth she served.

"Words can't describe what she did for me," said her foster son DJ. "Faye was a blessing to all of us. Every child she helped both past and present. She was a wonderful woman with a kind heart. She will have a special place in my heart and in everyone else's lives that she touched."

Faye had a heart of gold and worked tirelessly to help kids gain the skills and education they needed to go out into the world.

Fellow Marsh foster parent Shana Fryer said her best memory of Faye was rooming with her at a conference several years ago. "I miss Faye dearly, and am a better person for knowing her," she said.

The four boys that were living with Faye at the time of her death are doing well and adjusting admirably. They miss Faye and talk of her often.

"Faye helped me get over my anger. If it wasn't for her, I would be the mean, ugly monster that I used to be," said her foster son Isaac. "She had a great deal of compassion for kids and loved what she did. She was willing to help anyone that would take it."

Thanks to Pamela Reagan, foster care consultant, who volunteered to be the temporary, live-in family teacher at Senior Hall, they've had a familiar face step up and care for them during this difficult time.

Another current foster son simply said, "she never gave up on us."

From the Trustee's desk ...

As the newest trustee of The Marsh Foundation, I have spent the past few months trying to absorb as much information as I can about the current operations of The Marsh. Growing up in Van Wert, I thought I knew a lot about The Marsh Foundation and their beautiful facilities. When I drove by The Marsh I was always impressed by the well maintained buildings and the beautiful setting.

During family gatherings I used to listen to the "good old days at The Marsh Foundation" stories from my father-in-law, Dan Jerome, who used to work there. On several occasions, during my conversations with my friend Ron Bagley, I had the opportunity to garner a lot of additional information about the rich history of The Marsh Foundation and the benevolence of Mr. George Marsh.

Upon my appointment to the board, several of the former Marsh students made an effort to welcome me to The Marsh family and told me of their fond memories of growing up at The Marsh.

I soon realized that the common thread of my conversations with all of these different people was the pride they had from being associated with The Marsh Foundation. But I also garnered from them that they felt The Marsh is different today than it was years ago.

From what I have learned from my short time on the Marsh board, I would agree that the young people who are part of The Marsh Foundation today are different from those who were there years ago. Most young people, no matter where they are, are different today than the young people who grew up years ago. Society has changed and the breakdown of the family structure has impacted a larger number of children than in years past; young people are suffering severe emotional and physical damage because of it.

As much as I wish we could go back to the good old days we can't, nor can we ignore the charge Mr. Marsh placed before us in 1922 "to help provide effective training and support to children and families in a safe, secure environment."

During my short time on the board I have been tremendously impressed by the dedication, energy and emotional care demonstrated by The Marsh staff. This is essential for the educational and emotional development of these young people. I have witnessed the staff making personal sacrifices during a tragedy to help the students at Marsh cope with a difficult situation while they themselves were suffering.

The employees also went the extra mile when winter storms shut down most of the community to make sure the students were safe and well cared for, and the facilities could maintain close to normal operations.

Even though the youth of today may be different from the youth of past years in some respects, the care given to the young people at The Marsh Foundation is still the same excellent care that they were given years ago.

In closing, I would like to

take this time to thank The Marsh Foundation staff and the Marsh students, both former and current, for making me feel so welcome. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Mr. Gary Corcoran and Mr. Bob Gamble, board of trustees members, in addition to Mr. Jeff Grothouse, Mr. Roger Salisbury and Ms. Kim Mullins for taking the extra time to explain the many complexities of The Marsh. Thank you all for allowing me to be part of The Marsh family.


Spring Plant Sale and Homestead Tours in May



Clay Named Newest Marsh Foundation Trustee

The Third District Court of Appeals named Gary L. Clay as the newest member of The Marsh Foundation Board of Trustees in January. He is the 18th Trustee to serve on the board since it was established in 1922. He replaced retiring Trustee Gerald Thatcher, who served as a Trustee since July of 2002.

Clay brings a wealth of experiences to his new position and said he is excited about the opportunity to serve The Marsh. He will join Bob Gamble and Gary Corcoran who are currently on the board. "I'm really excited about this because I think it is a great opportunity to make an impact on young people's lives," Clay said. "I know kids at The Marsh have had their struggles but giving them the opportunity to succeed is what I think is really important. I'm going to do the best I can to help The Marsh in any way," he added.

Clay is a lifelong resident of Van Wert who graduated from Bluffton College with a double major in accounting and business administration. He is currently the president of Van Wert Federal Savings Bank and is a member of the bank's board of directors. He is the secretary of the Van Wert County Hospital Board of Trustees, the vice-president of the Business Development Corporation Board and also serves on the Board of Trustees of the Van Wert County Foundation, Huntington University President's Advisory Board and the Van Wert City tax abatement

committee.

In the past, Clay has served as president of the Van Wert Chamber of Commerce and the Van Wert Sertoma Club, as well as the boards of the United Way, Junior Achievement, Van Wert Historical Society, Habitat for Humanity, Crime Stoppers, Family Caring Center, Pregnancy Life Center, Van Wert County Extension Advisory Board and Van Wert Band Parents. He is also an active member of Trinity United Methodist Church.

Gary and his wife Melissa have 4 children, Erica Clay, Lydia Mendenhall, Laura Scott and Andrew Clay. They also have five grandchildren; all of whom reside in the Van Wert area.

Garden Assistant Needed

The Marsh is currently in search of a person to assist with the daily functions of the youth garden program this summer. The person will work alongside our activities coordinator in organizing and managing the summer garden program and youth involved. They will assist in greenhouse work of seed starting and plant growth maintenance, assist in outside garden work of planning, planting, weed management, harvesting, and marketing of garden produce for sales and assist in maintaining garden market records, youth payroll, and media records.

A high school diploma is required and experience in working with troubled youth and/or youth development is preferred. The selected person must have knowledge and experience with gardening and plant production.

The position will be temporary, running from May/June through August/September, depending on the person's availability. The assistant needs to be at least 21 years of age and able to work unsupervised with youth. A standard background check and fingerprinting will be required, as well as a TB test. A valid driving license is required, as is first aid/CPR training.
