From the Executive's desk ...

write this letter in the hopes all of you will mark your calendars for August 1 and 2. It is time again to celebrate the Marsh Alumni on the campus of The Marsh Foundation. Already the wheels are in motion for a Saturday evening of dinner and fellowship along with a Sunday of lunch, tours, education, memorabilia and history. You and your families are welcome to enjoy this beautiful campus and all we have to offer the students of The Marsh Foundation.

The past and current year's maintenance projects include the following: The installation of a generator to power the entire campus, along with burying of the overhead power, cable and telephone lines. These overhead lines are being buried to provide a safe uninterrupted electrical service to the campus and security for our students.

The maintenance staff will be repainting the metal roofs of the barns, quonset and maintenance building on campus. The installation of security doors on the Administration Building will require employees to use a key fob for entry and visitors to request entry into the building. This security is for the safety of our students during the school hours and employees through the year.

A repair of the yards and planting of grass on the campus grounds will begin when the

ground is fit to work. We are each year planting trees to continue the beautiful green campus of The Marsh Foundation. The north and west sidewalks, on campus, have been replaced along with benches installed to sit and reflect on the days memories.

The maintenance and warehouse staffs are always proactively keeping The Marsh campus in top condition for our clients. The Marsh Foundation recently passed on purchasing the Campus of Starr Commonwealth located five miles east of the current Marsh campus. It is a beautiful site with many buildings, swimming pool and gymnasium. It was determined, if we ever come to a decision to expand The Marsh services and campus, we can build on our own site.

The Marsh Foundation Trustees have added to The Marsh farms, Stanfield Farm (135 acres surrounding the Starr Commonwealth Campus) and Rager Farm (75 acres north of the Marsh Home Farm next to SR. 224). This brings the total Marsh farms to 2,680 acres of Crop Acres. In 2014, the farm income amounted to \$709,686 or \$287 per acre. The farm income is approximately 13 percent of the Marsh Foundation annual income. Currently, the Marsh home and school farm makes up approximately 1,104 acres of The Marsh farm land assets.

The dream and wish list longterm capital improvement project for the Campus includes the construction of a new school wing attached to the Administration Building along with a gymnasium for our kids to enjoy physical exercise activities.

A question I am always asked is: How much does the endowment contribute to the functions of The Marsh Foundation

campus? The Marsh Foundation is divided into three separate divisions contributing to achieve the same goal ... to care for children and families. The Residential Staff – obviously care for the day-to-day needs, home, transportation, food, time and praise, nurturing or discipline of the children. The School Staff – provide the students their educational needs. The Business Office – provides the support for the campus. Such as paying the bills, payroll, maintenance issues, food preparation and cleanliness. These three separate divisions provide their own budgets to follow for The Marsh fiscal year ending in June. Once the individual budgets are approved, the entire budget comes together to form The Marsh Foundation Income & Expense Budget.

Currently, the investment portfolio of George H. Marsh provides approximately 28 percent of the income. The commercial property leases and farm incomes provide approximately 16 percent of the income. The Residential Services, Clinical & Foster Care incomes from State, County and Local governmental assistance and Medicaid provides the other 56 percent of income needed to provide the children with quality, professional and safe care. The breakdown of expense percentages by division are approximately Business Office 13 percent, School 13 percent and Residential Services, Clinical & Foster Care 74 percent.

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Vance Hall Staff Planned Interactive Military Demonstration for Youth

Recently, family teacher David Beck planned an interactive and educational afternoon for the boys at Vance Hall. He brought in a room-full of memorabilia and items from his time in the military.

There were a wide variety of items that he brought. They included pictures, uniforms, medals and many other things.

The boys were encouraged to look and ask questions. They learned a lot about the Army and what is expected of United States soldiers. They were able to form a new respect for members of the military, their families and their sacrifices.

Vance Hall is consistently challenged with coming up with new and unique ideas to engage

and challenge its youth. Recently, they've been implementing special evening programs such as this one to do just that. Program manager Matt Tuttle says his

hope is that the boys will be able to expand interest in subjects that they otherwise might not have been exposed to.

Senior Hall Staff Building Strong Program

The staff at Senior Hall have been working very hard to build a great Independent Living program. According to consultant Elizabeth Pleasnick, they have been assessing the independent living skills that are needed by the boys in their care and also working with them daily on selfdetermination skills.

"Starting from the ground up they have come a long way in a short time, making improvements by reassessing their needs to make the program run more smoothly," said Pleasnick. "They continue to build a strong team unit and have received support from all on campus. We all look forward to continuing to see the strengths build and the program being a successful component for youth that are about the transition into the community."

Project Believe Continues to Donate to Youth at The Marsh Foundation

For the third year in a row, Project Believe has helped to make Christmas a little brighter for youth at The Marsh Foundation. The organization, which originated five years ago, has continued to grow and now delivers hundreds of presents to children in Ohio.

Tammie Rafferty, the group's founder, was inspired to help others by her own daughter's circumstances a few years ago. Then, gifts were wrapped and sorted in her living room. This year, more than 100 volunteers gathered at a local school gymnasium to sort and wrap.

Recently, warehouse space has been donated to the organization, which according to Rafferty will make their operation run much smoother.

Gifts include things like pajamas, slippers, blankets, socks, gloves, books and other goodies. Each group home also received a bag of items like games and puzzles to share among the house.

Shortly before Christmas, Senior Hall reopened and accepted new youth into its program. The home had no Christmas tree or decorations. After this was relayed to the Project Believe team, they stepped up in a big way.

In addition to presents for the boys in the home, they also brought a tree, lights and other decorations. The staff at Senior Hall were brought to tears by the generosity.

"Donations like this mean a lot to our kids," said Dawn Berryman, marketing and public relations specialist. "We continue to be impressed with the way Project Believe steps up and follows through at holiday time."

Not long after the Christmas holiday had passed, the organization again reached out to donate Valentine boxes for each youth on campus.

Project Believe staged many box decorating events in and around Tipp City to encourage others to donate and get in on the fun. The result was hundreds of beautifully decorated Valentine boxes that they then delivered to The Marsh and other facilities.

"Although simple, the Valentine boxes were a huge symbol of love for our youth. They included candy and cards as well as a hand-knitted heart," continued Berryman.

You may remember that Project Believe donated backpacks and school supplies last September as well. Their organization is growing and they are looking for more ways to utilize their resources and involve more volunteers. Independent Living Group an Important Part of Program

The Marsh Foundation clinical program includes an independent living group for youth ages 16 and over. This group focuses on issues and skills that will be important to youth once they emancipate.

This month, for instance, the group has focused on housing and what it takes to budget for an apartment.

Depending on the months' focus, the group's leader, CPST worker Christina Flinn, sends

out information to Marsh staff about what they can do to aid in the month's lessons.

This particular month, the youth have searched online for apartments and talked with landlords about costs, pets, etc. Most importantly, they've worked on budgeting and considering utilities, rent, insurance, deposits, furniture, transportation and the like.

The goal of the group is

to expose youth to as many circumstances and possibilities as they can to give them a realistic view of their future and what will be needed to sustain themselves.

The group provides the

youth with a manual that can be used outside of the group with others to enhance skills and conversations even further.

The Marsh is committed to helping youth prepare for adulthood as much as possible.

Senior Stuff

Senior Hall just recently transitioned into a group home for independent living aged boys. So far, the program is going very well. The home is a little different than others on campus, as it is only licensed for six beds. Currently, there are four boys living at Senior Hall, leaving two current openings.

The home is staffed by a fulltime, live-in program manager, Julie Hess. She is supported by two other, full-time family teachers.

The staff have been busy working with the youth on skills such as job hunting, grocery shopping and budgeting, as well as cooking and cleaning skills.

Two of the boys are eligible to graduate with their high school diploma this May. The graduation ceremony will be held on May 22. All are welcome to attend!



Vance Voice

Vance Hall is currently accepting referrals for its two openings. It is rare that this program does not have a waiting list and we anticipate these two beds being filled in the very near future. Summer Garden Assistant Needed

The Marsh is currently in search of a person to assist with the daily functions of the youth garden program this summer. The person will work alongside our activities coordinator in organizing and managing the summer garden program and youth involved. They will assist in greenhouse work of seed starting and plant growth maintenance, assist in outside garden work of planning, planting, weed management, harvesting, and marketing of garden produce for sales and assist in maintaining garden market records, youth payroll, and media records.

A high school diploma is required and experience in working with troubled youth and/

or youth development is preferred. The selected person must have knowledge and experience with gardening and plant production.

The position will be temporary, running from May/June through August/September, depending on the person's availability. The assistant needs to be at least 21 years of age and able to work unsupervised with youth. A standard background check and fingerprinting will be required, as well as a TB test. A valid driving license is required, as is first aid/CPR training.
