

The Marsh Foundation has relaunched their website with an emphasis on making it more user-friendly for constituents and referral sources. According to Kim Mullins, the executive director of Child & Family Services, it is important to have an organized, attractive website for families, caseworkers and others to use.

"We've redesigned our website in an effort to make the referral process easier for our clients," Mullins said. "We want those referring children for services, or inquiring about foster care opportunities, to have an easy clear path to do so," she added. The website, designed and hosted by Microtronix ESolutions, launched this week.

In addition to information about services, foster parenting and events, the site also has an employment page where job openings are listed and historical videos about the organization

and its roots. "While there is a lot of focus on our current offerings, we also wanted to ensure we honor our founders, George and Hilinda Marsh, with information on the site about our history," Mullins added. From the Executive's desk ...

he 2019-20 school year has been a busy one at The Marsh Foundation School. One of our major focuses this year has been transition. This initiative was started by Mrs. Mandy Looser, who oversees our Special Education program. Mrs. Looser writes transition goals in each of our student's Individualized Education Plans in an effort to prepare our students for their next step. Some of our students may be transitioning back to a regular school, while others go into college or the workforce. Regardless, we want to make sure that we set realistic goals to best prepare each student for their next step in life.

In the midst of planning to strengthen our student transitions, we received an opportunity to partner with Northwest State Community College and Ohio Means Jobs for workforce training. Eight of our students participated in a 12 week "Certified Production Technician Training." The purpose of this training was to learn core competencies of manufacturing production at the front line (entry level through frontline supervisor), including: Safety, Quality Practice & Measurement, Manufacturing Processes & Production,



and Maintenance Awareness. Two of our students earned a full Production Technician Certificate. The training was followed by a field trip to Cool Machines where students were able to tour the factory and ask questions.

One of the main messages that we are trying to push through this transition initiative is that students do not need to go straight into college to be successful. I feel that this common misconception sets students, like a lot of ours, up for failure. We are trying to get our students to realize that there are many businesses out there that are looking for quality individuals to fill good paying jobs that they can train right out of high school and give them guidance for further education, if that education is needed to grow within that

company. We feel that this pathway is more realistic for most of our students than sending them straight to college without a practical understanding of what their major entails.

Outside of Cool Machines, the school went on two other field trips earlier this year. One was to the bowling alley for some friendly competition, pizza, and a lot of fun. The other field trip was to the Armstrong Air and Space Museum in Wapak, Ohio. Mrs. Val Dunn led pre-field trip activities in her Social Studies classroom centered around the history of Neil Armstrong. On the trip, our students were able to learn more about space travel, participate in interactive activities, and try space food. Upon returning to school, Ms. Lauren Calvert led an

activity where students created parachutes for an egg drop.

Under the direction of Mrs. Karla Hoving, our students just finished up an art workshop where they created silver jewelry. Mrs. Hoying is certified as a Precious Metal Clay instructor and had the assistance of Jeannie Wenrick, who also specializes in art silver. The students created their own designs out of silver clay. Silver clay is a very fine, powdery silver mixed with an organic substance to create a clay-like texture. Once the pieces are created, they are dried and put in a kiln and fired at 1500 degrees. The organic substance will "burn out" in the kiln leaving the finished product being 99.9% silver. The students thoroughly enjoyed this all day workshop and were very proud of their final products.

Finally, we are approaching the end of the school year. Our students are preparing for our annual Wizard of Oz production, under the leadership of Mr. Tom Mayes. The play will be followed by an awards and graduation ceremony. We anticipate that we will have several graduates this Spring and are excited to celebrate this special time with them.

Kitchen Supervisor

Follows proper procedures for food preparation, cooking, food holding, food leftovers, food rotation, dating and all other food safety procedures. Training of Kitchen Staff. Plans monthly breakfast, lunch and dinner menus. Prepares daily food items according to the monthly menu for The Marsh Foundation employees, school staff, teachers and students. Orders necessary food, paper and necessities for the weekly menu from food distributors. Tracks inventory. Collects and verifies kitchen invoices and billings for payment by the Business Office. Cleans, deodorizes and disinfects the kitchen, kitchen equipment, plates, silverware and kitchen utensils to meet and exceed the standards of The Van Wert County Board of Health. Prepares for Health Department inspections. Maintains order and cleanliness in the commissary, freezers and refrigerators and all other areas related to the kitchen. Completes paperwork for State of Ohio breakfast and lunch school reimbursement program.

- 2. May be required to attend and pass a ServSafe Training Class.
- 3. Must have good communication skills with teachers, students and entire The Marsh Foundation Staff.

Marsh Foster Youth Wins Notable Scholarship



founder, was inspired to help others by her own daughter's circumstances. Their mission is to enrich the lives of youth and their caregivers in residential treatment centers. They provide gifts at Christmas, Valentine's Day, Easter and back-to-school time at various facilities.

Christmas gifts include things like pajamas, blankets, books, board games, art sets and journals. Residential staff at The Marsh graciously accepted all of the gifts before they were stashed away in anticipation for Christmas morning.

According to Megan Tuttle, director of residential services, The Marsh relies on donations such as these to increase opportunities for youth. Donations free up financial resources for other, needed items and experiences.
