As principal, I am extremely confident that we gave these two graduates tools that will help them become successful in their future endeavors.

Last fall, I wrote about a lot of change that we would be implementing this school year. As we all know, change can present many challenges and some resistance. The Marsh Foundation School is extremely fortunate to have staff members that will embrace anything that is in the best interest our students. We did face challenges and experience failures along the way, but our school's resilient attitude persevered, and we were able to accomplish a lot of great things.

School looks much different today than what most of us are traditionally used to. There is a need to individualize all instruction, appropriately chal-

Today's students are becoming increasingly more demanding in the following areas: relating curriculum to "real life" experiences, hands-on activities/projects, successful collaboration with peers, career-based learning, visual tools and technology based lessons, just to name a few. In reflecting on this past school year, I can proudly provide evidence to where our teachers are meeting these student demands through the curriculum they are teaching.

Here are a few of the things we did this school year:

• Started a Book Club;

• Went 1:1 with student computers;

• Visited and studied the Ohio Statehouse, also meeting Senator Hite;

• Created artwork out of recycled plastics ;

• Implemented a new technology class as well as an

On-line Curriculum;

• Compared/contrasted historic literature to current films;

• Developed structures made to withstand an Earthquake Simulator;

• Studied food safety supplemented with taste testing cow tongue, brain, gizzards and other unpopular delights;

• Created Holocaust Projects which were presented at Temple Beth Israel-Shaare Zedek in Lima, Ohio;

• Created career projects at the Fort Wayne Zoo for our elementary students;

• Explored "Code" in technology;

• Studied and presented on influential people in African American history;

• Had a Thanksgiving Project Competition; and

• Participated in and received recognition at a local Art Exhibition

Students were able to ask questions, received autographs and were able to meet the baseball star. One of the most meaningful things you can do in life to help a child is to become a foster parent. The Marsh Foundation celebrated Foster Care Appreciation Month throughout the month of May. The organization focused on recruiting additional families to help care for the many children in need.

The Marsh offers a continuum of care that includes a Foster Care Program. Last year, more than 100 children were turned away from our program because of a lack of foster homes. The Marsh believes that all children have the right to love, protection and to be cared for by a committed family.

tensive training. Certified foster parents are required to undergo continuing training to maintain their license.

Foster parents can be married couples or a single individual. Foster parents are substantially reimbursed for costs associated with caring for a foster child. Consultants are assigned to each foster family and are available 24 hours, seven days a week. Consultants help create the youth's treatment plan, offer support and are available in crisis situations.

Supper Club Season Concludes

The 2015-16 Supper Club season recently wrapped up with their last supper at Willow Bend Country Club. The Supper Club program is operated in conjunction with Big Brothers Big Sisters of Auglaize, Mercer and Van Wert Counties. Matches meet in a group setting twice a month for supper and an activity. They also schedule one-onone time throughout the month.

The beginning of the season started with eight matches and five of those matches finished the complete season. Three matches ended early due to kids leaving The Marsh program.

The Marsh Foundation is very grateful to the amazing volunteers who give of their precious time, energy and efforts to make meaningful relationships with those kids who have minimal family involvement or outside support.


Marsh Youth Spend Spring Break Serving Others

For the past several years, the youth at The Marsh Foundation have completed service projects during their spring break that revolve around the theme of serving others. This year, they continued their efforts.

Activities coordinator Sherry Grone coordinated the week's projects. To start, a group of independent living aged youth prepared and served the meal Good Friday evening at the Van Wert Bread & Bowl at First United Methodist.

The Marsh girls spent time helping with the Van Wert City Easter Egg Hunt and a small group also volunteered at the Humane Society's Animal Shelter, cleaning and socializing animals in need of extra care. During the week, they also took a trip to Ft. Wayne and worked at Miss Virginia's Food Pantry, serving a record high 388 individuals.

One group of boys volunteered at the Lima Rescue Mission, serving dinner to homeless men and cleaning up after the meal. Another group went to

George, Hilinda and Katie Marsh left a strong legacy by being compassionate and helping the less fortunate in the Van Wert community. Hilinda, especially, left behind writings that were very spiritual in nature. In her funeral memorial it was quoted, "Many were the days when she went about in her wellprovisioned carriage, helping the sick and needy, in the very joy of her Master who went about doing good. In the church [she was] a humble and conscientious follower of the Christ; a leader for years in the Ladies' Society of the church. Our sense of loss is deep; we shall ever hold her services in grateful remembrance." The Marsh Foundation continues to build on and carry out that legacy and this is the inspiration behind these service projects.


Student Holocaust Projects Receive Regional Attention

During April, youth at The Marsh Foundation School learned about the Holocaust and each completed projects on the topic. In conclusion, Connie Hornung from the Jewish Temple in Lima visited campus and spoke to students and staff about Jewish cultural traditions.

Students had their projects on display and also prepared refreshments that were related to the Jewish culture. Hornung was impressed with the students' efforts and invited them to display their projects in Lima at the Temple Beth Israel-Shaare Zedek during their Holocaust Remembrance Day and Israel Independence Day Sabbath Service in May.

They displayed before and after the service, answering questions and explaining their projects to visitors. They also participated in a reception afterwards. It was an educational and beneficial experience for the youth involved.

Interviews for on-campus jobs took place recently and some of the boys are anxiously awaiting to hear the results.




Senior Stuff

Independent Living Aged Youth Appreciate Opportunities

Time and time again, the Independent Living Program at The Marsh Foundation proves to be a valued component of our continuum of care. Not only are adults and guardians pleased with the results; the youth themselves recognize the benefits.

"When I came, they automatically wanted me to be a part of the group," said Carl, a youth that has been at The Marsh since March. "I was excited because I had the opportunity to work right away," he said.

The IDL group focuses on things like budgeting, getting

along with peers, time management, etc. According to Carl, these skills are very important to him because when he leaves he'll be 18. "This is helping me to get ready for the future," he said.

A component of the IDL program is the Marsh Grown garden crew. The crew works on planting, watering and caring for the large organic garden on campus. They are able to harvest their produce and sell it at the local farmer's market in town. They learn job skills while they are participating in a program that uses a vocational horticultural therapy approach that ties directly into the overall behavioral therapy that they are receiving at The Marsh.

Although the summer growing season is the busiest time for the garden crew, they don't just have the rest of the year off. They sell poinsettias before Christmas and have a spring plant sale in May. They spend time in the greenhouse growing seedlings that they'll later be able to transplant to the garden.

Proceeds earned at the market and at other sales are divided between all the youth working on the project. This gives them income as well as a sense of pride and accomplishment.

The youth also learn leadership skills through opportunities such as 4H. Many youth on campus have summer projects and participate in a Marsh 4H club. This gives youth the opportunity to expand even further on things they are learning in the IDL group.
