# Marsh Foundation to Host Event to Raise Funds to Fight Child Abuse

In an effort to raise awareness and funds to fight child abuse, The Marsh Foundation is teaming up with the Family and Children First Council of Van Wert County to host the first annual 'Run to End Child Abuse.' All proceeds of this event will be donated to the Van Wert FCFC to help end child abuse in Van Wert County.

"We see the after affects of child abuse daily in the youth that we serve and are passionate about helping to put an end to abuse and neglect in our communities," said Kim Mullins, executive director of Child and Family Services. "April is Child Abuse Prevention Month and we are hoping we can raise some awareness and help combat this serious issue."

The event will feature a 5K walk/run as well as a one mile fun run for kids. It will be held on Saturday, April 29 on The Marsh Foundation's beautiful campus in Van Wert. Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m., with the fun run beginning at 9:30 a.m. and the 5K at 10 a.m. Registration will be held at the Recreation Hall on the northeast side of campus.

## **Closet 1:27 Connects with Marsh Foster Care Program**

Closet 1:27 is an initiative operated by Woodburn Missionary Church in Woodburn, IN. The ministry provides support and supplies for Christian adoptive and foster families. They learned of The Marsh Foundation's need through one of our

own foster families.

Closet 1:27 provides two main services for adoptive and foster families: foster journey bags and its resource closet. They recently delivered 28 journey bags to give to Marsh foster youth. The bags are filled according to gender and age and include things like pajamas, blankets, books, toiletries, a Bible and much more.

"We are thrilled that Closet 1:27 has reached out to The Marsh Foster Care Program," said Melissa Gearhart, foster care supervisor. "Our kids often come into care with little that belongs to them and this program gives them something that they can call their own. Plus, the items in the bags are quality, useful items that are very much appreciated by our kids and our foster parents."

According to Closet 1:27, the foster journey bags are meant to help foster children feel the love and concern of others, and introduce them to, or remind them of the love of their Heavenly Father.

Bruce D. Perry, MD, PhD presenting on trauma, the effects on the brain and what can be done to promote healing

If you parent, work with or develop policy regarding children this training is a must in understanding how trauma impacts children and what can be done to help them heal.

Dr. Perry's trainings are informative, easy to understand and the information can easily be transferred to "every day" life.

Dr. Perry has conducted both basic neuroscience and clinical research. His clinical research and practice has focused on high-risk children. This work has examined the cognitive, behavioral, emotional, social, and physiological effects of neglect and trauma in children, adolescents and adults. This work has been instrumental in describing how childhood experiences, including neglect and traumatic stress, change the biology of the brain – and, thereby, the health of the child.

His clinical research over the last ten years has been focused on integrating emerging principles of developmental neuroscience into clinical practice. This work has resulted in the development of innovative clinical practices and programs working with maltreated and traumatized children, most prominently the Neurosequential Model©, a developmentally sensitive, neurobiology-informed approach to clinical work, education and caregiving. This approach to clinical problem solving has been integrated into the programs at dozens of large public and non-profit organizations serving at-risk children and their families.

His experience as a clinician and a researcher with traumatized children has led many community and governmental agencies to consult Dr. Perry following high-profile incidents involving traumatized children such as the Branch Davidian siege in Waco (1993), the Oklahoma City bombing (1995), the Columbine school shootings (1999), the September 11<sup>th</sup> terrorist attacks (2001), Hurricane Katrina (2005), the FLDS polygamist sect (2008), the earthquake in Haiti (2010), the tsunami in Tohoku Japan (2011) and the Sandy Hook Elementary school shootings (2012).

This is a FREE training to residence and providers in Mercer, Paulding and Van Wert Counties.

There will be a \$100 charge to those outside this area. Space will be limited. A free box lunch will be provided. CEUs are pending for Counseling, Social Work and Teaching. Registration will open April 3, 2017 (more information will be forthcoming).
